Introduction

According to its mission statement, the primary purpose of the University of Wisconsin - Milwaukee is to provide Wisconsin's largest metropolitan area with a major comprehensive doctoral university. In the fall semester of 2000, UWM served more than 23,000 students with a staff of about 3,300 employees and a 2000-01 budget in excess of \$351 million. Given the size of the university and breadth of its mission, the student population, and the programs in which they are enrolled, is extremely diverse.

There are four distinct groups of students served by the University. Undergraduate students enrolled in baccalaureate degree programs make up the largest group, comprising 77% of the student population. Graduate students enrolled in master's and doctoral degree programs represent 15% of students. Undergraduate special students (undergraduate students not enrolled in degree programs) comprise 6% of students, and non-degree candidates in the Graduate School represent 2% of the student population. Within these groups, there is also considerable diversity. The Student Profile section provides additional information on each of these groups of students.

A significant portion (40%) of UWM students attends school part-time.

There is considerable variation in the credit load carried by students. For undergraduate students, the average credit load is 11.4, with 14% of undergraduates enrolling for six or less credits and over 29% enrolling for 15 or more credits. Similarly, the average credit load for graduate students is 5.7, with 39% of graduate students enrolling for three or less credits and 30% enrolling for eight or more credits. The average credit load for undergraduate special students and non-degree candidates is 5.8 and 3.9, respectively. The Credit Load section contains additional information on enrollment and credit load of students by academic area and year level.

The number of students who report being employed while attending UWM is 9,173, or 40% of the student population. See the Student Employment Status section for additional information.

Of the total student population, 3,630 (16%) are enrolled exclusively in courses which meet in the evening. This includes about 8% of undergraduates, 37% of undergraduate special students, 40% of graduates and 68% of graduate non-degree students. The majority (57%) of the evening student population is female. Evening students generate a total of 16,365 credits with an average credit load of 4.5, which constitutes about 7% of the total credits at UWM. See the Evening Students section for details.

UWM serves a racially diverse population consisting of 8% African-American students, 2% Asian students, 2% Southeast Asian students, 1% Native American students, 4% Hispanic students, 80% White students and 3% Foreign students. Breakdowns by race appear in the Headcount Enrollment, Evening Student, and Degrees Granted sections.

Women represent 56% of the total student population at UWM. The percentage of women varies considerably by school/college, ranging from 16% in Engineering to 92% in Nursing. Women comprise 54% of the undergraduate students and 59% of graduate students. Breakdowns by gender appear in the Headcount Enrollment, Evening Student, and Degrees Granted sections.

The average age of all students at UWM is 25, ranging from an average of 23 for undergraduates to 36 for doctoral candidates in the Graduate School. The Student Characteristics section provides information on average student age by year level.

UWM awards degrees in 86 different baccalaureate degree programs, 47 master's programs and 18 doctoral programs. In 2000-01, 2,608 bachelor's, 1,049 Master's and 97 doctoral degrees were awarded. See the Degrees Granted section for details.

Tuition for resident, undergraduate students did not increase from 1999-00 to 2000-01. Tuition for resident, graduate students increased by 7% during this period. Financial aid awarded to UWM students also increased. Total financial aid accepted by UWM students increased from \$77,005,415 in 1999-00 to \$80,478,943 in 2000-01. The Grants, Loans and Fees section contains information on tuition and fees and sources of financial aid at UWM.

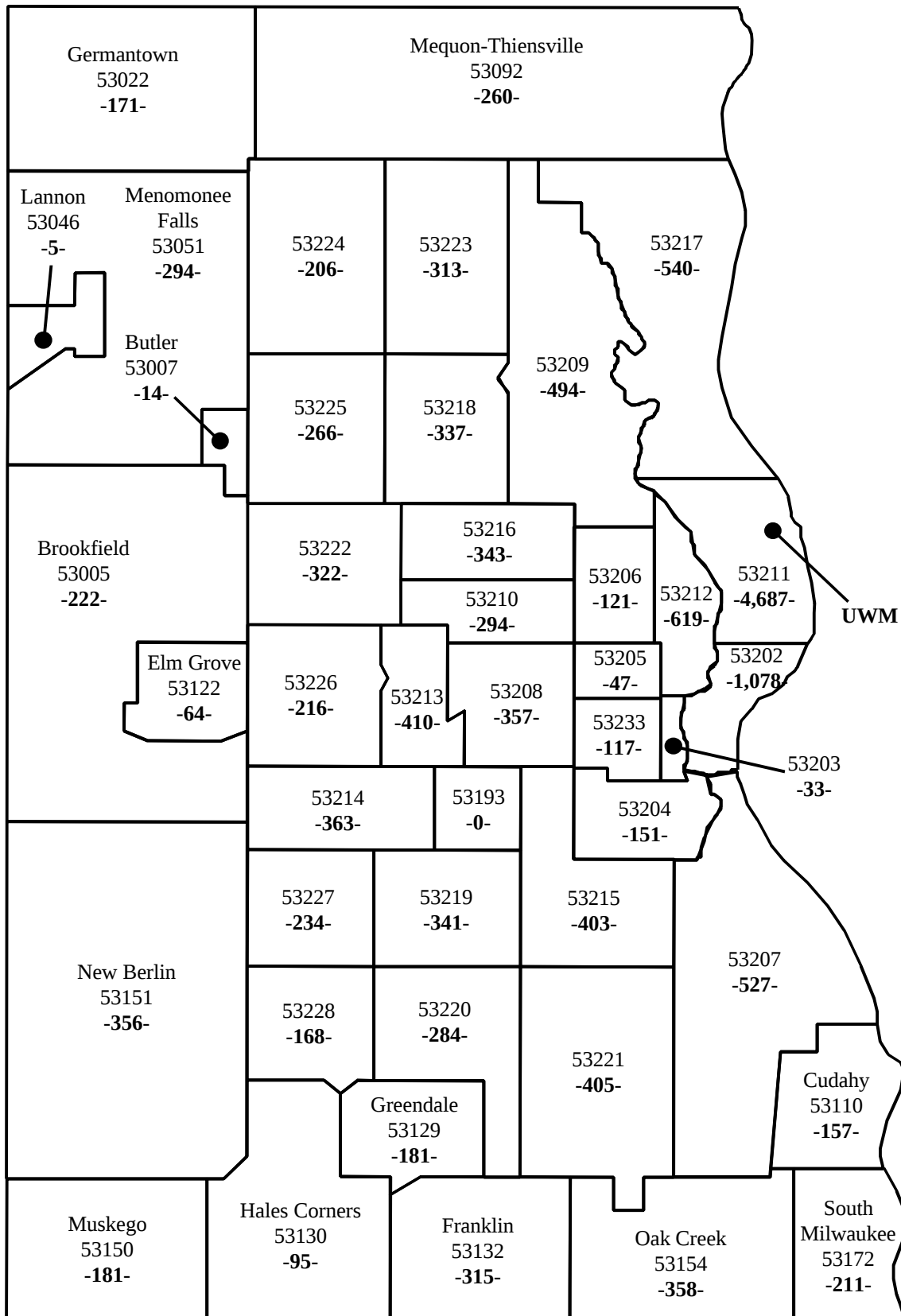
Total funding for UWM increased by 11.3%, from \$316 million in 1999-00 to almost \$352 million in 2000-01. Of the total, 36% came from state appropriations and the remainder came from student fees and other sources. See the University Budget Data section for details.

UWM had 3,295 full and part-time non-student employees on the October 2000 payroll. Of these, 708 held ranked faculty appointments and 489 were instructional academic staff. See the Faculty/Staff Employment section for details.

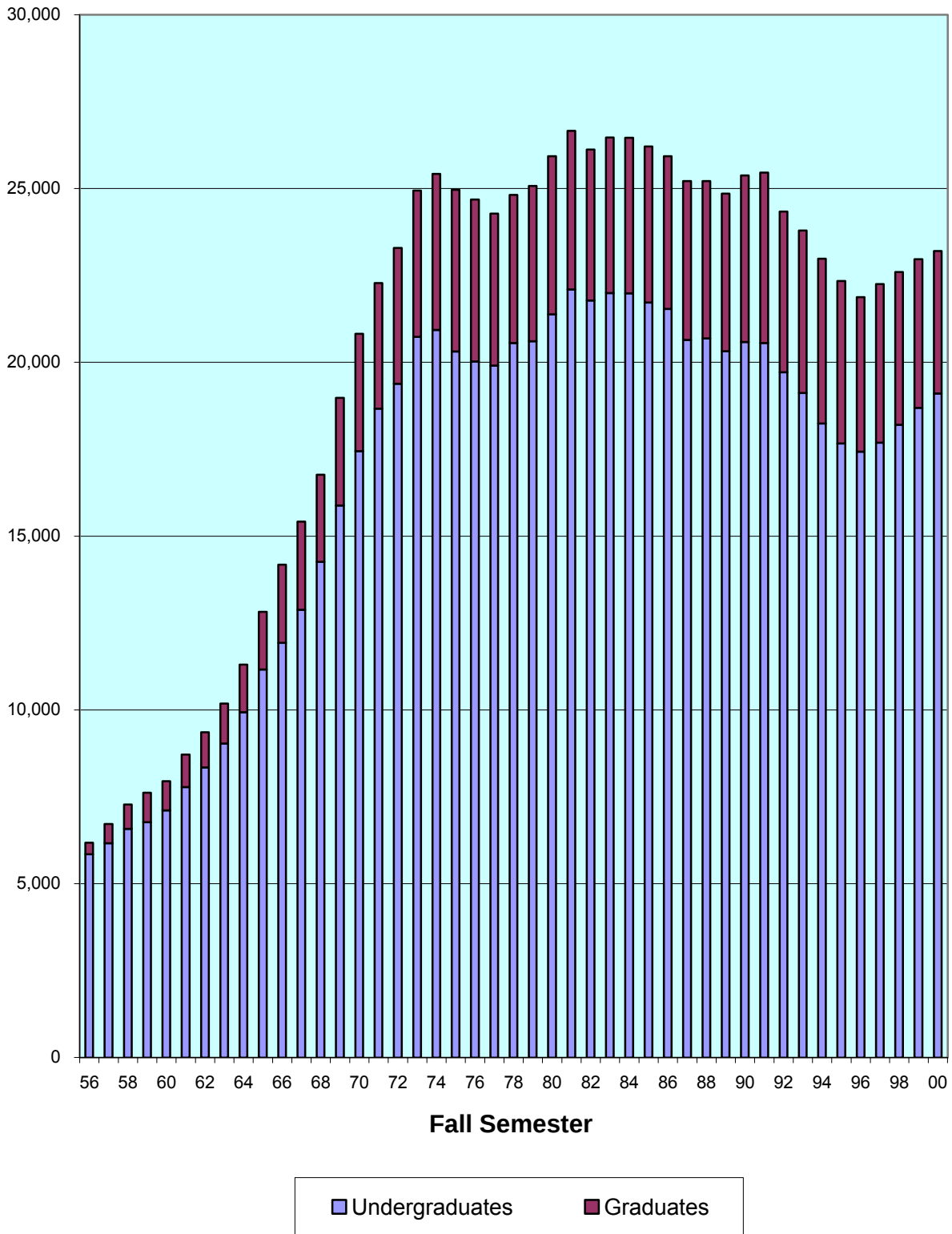

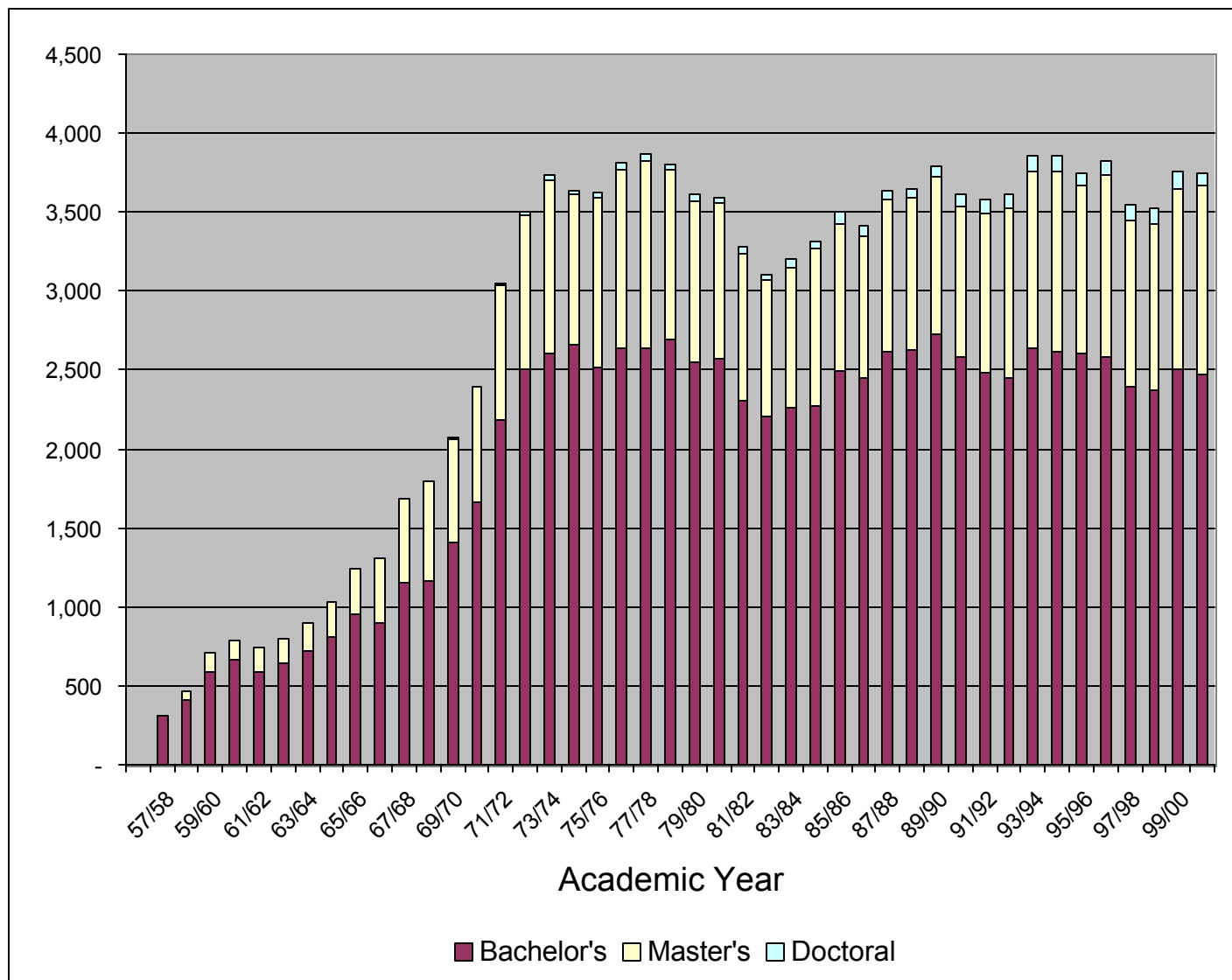

GRANTS, LOANS AND FEES

University of Wisconsin--Milwaukee

Financial Aid

Grants and loans have become increasingly important to students as resources to help finance educational costs. Each semester the Financial Aid Department at UWM assists thousands of students in obtaining funding from the grant or loan programs offered on campus.

Some grants or loans are specifically aimed at particular groups, such as minorities, the disadvantaged, or the disabled. There are also programs aimed at reaching students within a particular school or college. This summary does not include all of the different programs available to our students, but it does cover the more widely used ones. To receive more explicit information about the availability of grants or loans, please contact the UWM Financial Aid Office.

Federal Pell Grant - Available to students while pursuing their first undergraduate degree. The grants range from \$200 to \$3,750 annually.

Federal Supplementary Educational Opportunity Grant (SEOG) - Available to the student until the undergraduate degree is received. These grants range from \$200 to \$1,000 annually.

Wisconsin Higher Educational Grant - Available only to undergraduate residents of Wisconsin. Grants range from \$250 to \$1,800 annually.

Federal Direct Stafford Loan (subsidized and unsubsidized) - Students who completed a financial aid application may have received a Federal Stafford Loan as part of their financial aid package. These loans are serviced through a bank, savings bank, or credit union. Annual limits are as follows: freshmen may receive up to \$2,625 annually; sophomores up to \$3,500; juniors and seniors up to \$5,500. Undergraduates may receive up to \$23,000 cumulatively. Graduate students may receive up to \$18,500 annually and \$138,500 cumulatively. Borrowers must begin repayment six months after leaving college. Interest rates are variable and begin to accrue for subsidized loans at this time. For unsubsidized loans, borrowers pay the interest while in school. Beginning in 1995-96, the university began participation in the Federal Direct Student Loan Program and ceased to participate in the Stafford Program. Eligibility requirements and borrowing levels, however, remained the same.

Federal Perkins Loan - These loans may total up to \$20,000 for undergraduate education, and \$40,000 for combined undergraduate and graduate education. Repayment and 5% interest are deferred until nine months after ceasing to be enrolled at least half- time.

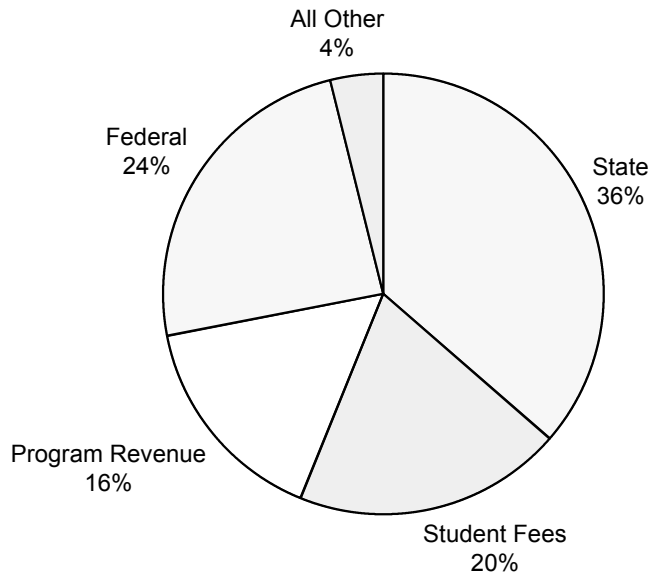

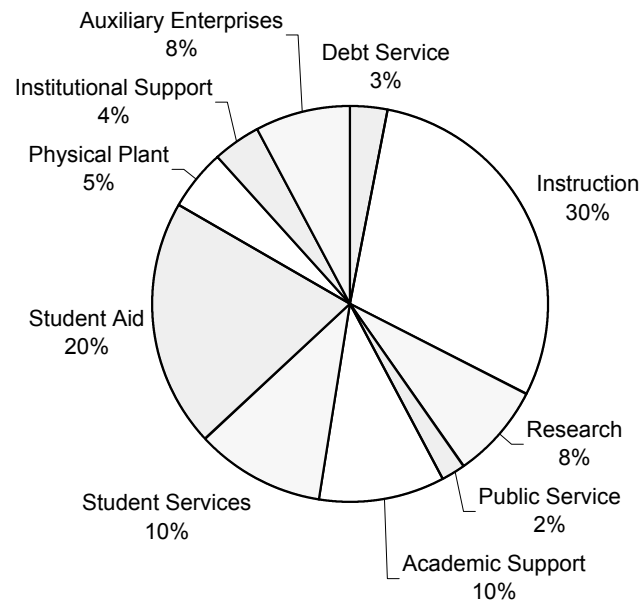

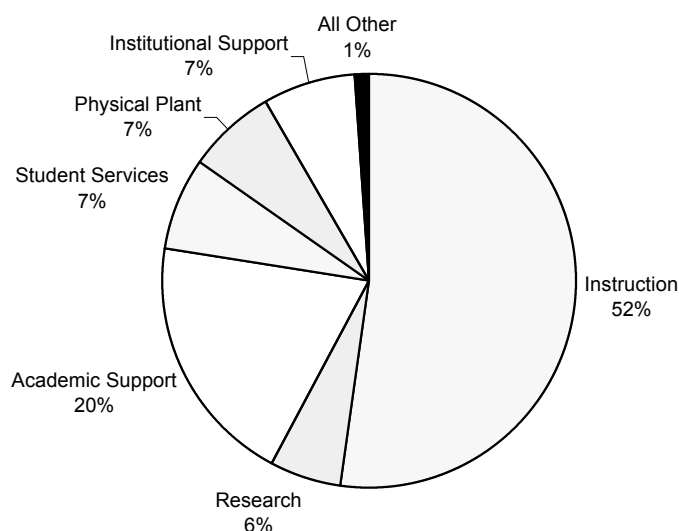

Use of Funds By Program - State Program Funds



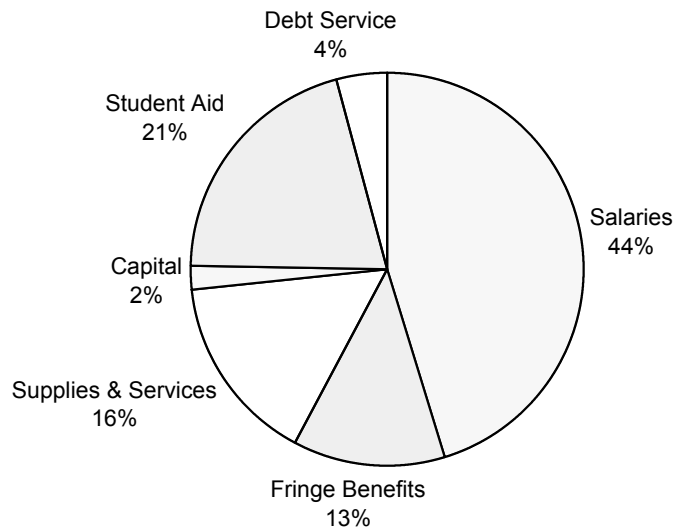

Definitions of Terms Used in the Fact Book

ACADEMIC AREA:	School or college, such as Letters and Science, Education, Nursing, etc.								
AGE:	Student ages are computed as of August 31, 1999.								
AREA OF STUDY or CLASSIFICATION:	Indicates the student's course of study and/or degree program. Also called the Student Classification.								
CURRENT ENTRY STATUS:	<table><tr><td>New:</td><td>The student is in his/her first semester at UWM as a new freshman or graduate student.</td></tr><tr><td>Continuing:</td><td>The student is continuing at UWM at the same level (undergraduate, special or graduate) as in the immediately preceding semester.</td></tr><tr><td>Reentry:</td><td>The student is returning to UWM at the same level as their last enrollment at UWM after an absence of one or more semesters.</td></tr><tr><td>Transfer:</td><td>An advanced standing student in his/her first semester at UWM as a transfer from another college or as a special student.</td></tr></table>	New:	The student is in his/her first semester at UWM as a new freshman or graduate student.	Continuing:	The student is continuing at UWM at the same level (undergraduate, special or graduate) as in the immediately preceding semester.	Reentry:	The student is returning to UWM at the same level as their last enrollment at UWM after an absence of one or more semesters.	Transfer:	An advanced standing student in his/her first semester at UWM as a transfer from another college or as a special student.
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EVENING STUDENT:	A student taking classes only in the evening (4:30 p.m. or later) or on weekends.								
FTE:	One full-time equivalent (FTE) student equates to a non-graduate student taking 15 credits, a master's student taking 12 credits, or a doctoral student taking 7 credits.								
GPO FUND:	General program operations fund: money from several sources pooled together for budget and expenditure purposes. This is the largest single operational fund and includes a state appropriation for operations, student academic fee receipts and a small portion of federal indirect cost reimbursement. The fund number is 101.								

MAJOR/OPTION:	The particular field in which a student has chosen to take concentrated work. Majors are recorded only for juniors, seniors and graduate students in this report.
NDC:	A non-degree candidate in the graduate school is a student earning graduate credit who is not enrolled in a master's or doctoral program.
NON-GRADUATE:	A collective term for undergraduate degree student and undergraduate special students.
PART-TIME STUDENT:	A non-graduate student carrying less than 12 credits or a graduate student carrying less than 12 credits.
RESIDENT BY FEE:	A student assessed resident tuition and fees.
SPECIAL STUDENT:	A student earning undergraduate course credits who is not working toward a degree at UWM.
UNDERGRADUATE:	A collective term for freshmen, sophomores, juniors and seniors. Does not include special students.
YEAR IN SCHOOL:	The student's class standing (freshman, sophomore, etc.) based on credits earned in their academic area. Also called year status.
