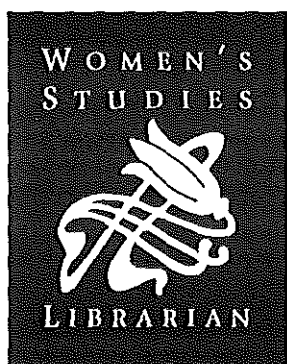

Periodical literature is the cutting edge of women's scholarship, feminist theory, and much of women's culture. *Feminist Periodicals: A Current Listing of Contents* is published by the Office of the University of Wisconsin System Women's Studies Librarian on a quarterly basis with the intent of increasing public awareness of feminist periodicals. It is our hope that *Feminist Periodicals* will serve several purposes: to keep the reader abreast of current topics in feminist literature; to increase readers' familiarity with a wide spectrum of feminist periodicals; and to provide the requisite bibliographic information should a reader wish to subscribe to a journal or to obtain a particular article at her library or through interlibrary loan. (Users will need to be aware of the limitations of the new copyright law with regard to photocopying of copyrighted materials.)

Table of contents pages from current issues of major feminist journals are reproduced in each issue of *Feminist Periodicals*, preceded by a comprehensive annotated listing of all journals we have selected. As publication schedules vary enormously, not every periodical will have table of contents pages reproduced in each issue of *FP*. The annotated listing provides the following information on each journal:

1. Year of first publication.
2. Frequency of publication.
3. U.S. subscription price(s).
4. Subscription address.
5. Current editor.
6. Editorial address (if different from subscription address).
7. International Standard Serials Number (ISSN).
8. OCLC, Inc. Control Number.
9. Locations where the journal is held in the UW System.
10. Publications in which the journal is indexed.
11. Fulltext products in which publication appears.
12. Subject focus/statement of purpose of the journal.

Please note that in the actual text, only the numbers 1 to 12 are used to identify the different categories of information.

Our goal is to have represented in *FP* all English-language feminist periodicals with a substantial national or regional readership, with an emphasis on scholarly journals and small press offerings. We do not include publications which, though feminist in philosophy, do not focus solely on women's issues. Nor, with few exceptions, do we include newsstand magazines. We are also forced to omit periodicals which lack a complete table of contents. We encourage feminist serials to build a full table of contents into their regular format to facilitate the indexing feminist literature sorely needs.

Interested readers will find more complete information on feminist periodicals in *DWM: A Directory of Women's Media* published by the National Council for Research on Women (530 Broadway at Spring Street, New York, NY 10012); and in *Women's Periodicals and Newspapers: A Union List of the Holdings of Madison Area Libraries*, edited by James P. Danky, compiled by Maureen E. Hady, Barry Christopher, and Neill E. Strache (Boston: G.K. Hall, 1982).

Suggestions for improvements of *Feminist Periodicals* are gratefully received. We would particularly appreciate assistance from readers in the UW-System with our efforts to keep the holding information complete and up to date. Please let us know about new subscriptions, subscriptions we have overlooked, cancellations, or other pertinent information. *Feminist Periodicals* is also available on microfilm at the library of the State Historical Society of Wisconsin.

Introduction: From Nowhere to Everywhere: Lesbian Geographies 1
Gill Valentine

This paper provides an introduction to this volume by outlining the emergence of lesbian geographies and the contribution they have made to understanding the mutual constitution of sexuality and space. It begins by tracing the development of these geographies from initial studies which aimed to map lesbian neighbourhoods to later work which has drawn on theorists such as Judith Butler, to explore the production and regulation of heterosexual space. It then goes on to situate the papers included in this volume within this literature by outlining their contents and the themes which crosscut them.

Lesbian Living Spaces: Multiple Meanings of Home 11
Sarah A. Elwood

This paper is an exploration of lesbian living spaces, focusing on the diverse experiences and meanings of home and neighborhood in lesbian communities. These issues are developed from interviews conducted with lesbians in the metropolitan area of Minneapolis and St. Paul, Minnesota. Lesbian communities are heterogeneous, made up of individuals who might share a common sexual identity, but differ in their race, class, religious, or ethnic identity. Thus, lesbian living spaces have multiple meanings for the individuals and communities who create and live in them. In so far as these spaces are sites of identity formation and spaces in which some lesbians contest dominant cultural norms, they are places of liberation. But because they are sometimes simultaneously places where lesbians encounter harassment and discrimination, they are places of oppression. I will argue that these contradictory meanings make it impossible to define these living spaces as absolutely 'public' or 'private' spaces.

Flagrantly Flaunting It?: Contesting Perceptions of Locational
Identity Among Urban Vancouver Lesbians 29
Jenny Lo
Theresa Healy

The city of Vancouver has two overtly identified gay and lesbian areas: West-end, primarily perceived to be associated with men, and East-end, mostly identified with lesbians; thus, where the genderization of space and the sexualization of space converge, the urban lesbian and gay landscape is often gendered by spatial association. In reality, however, lesbian and gay enclaves exist outside these more popular locations and beyond the city peripheries and these two specific locations are not as neatly ordered as their mythical simplicity might suggest. This research explores the construction of lesbian spaces in metro Vancouver through extensive research which began during summer 1996, and the perceptions and expectations of lesbians living in both the East-end and the West-end of Vancouver will be examined. This introductory paper provides a discussion on the opposing views of lesbians in Vancouver expressed in the survey which explode commonly held myths and stereotypes of lesbians in the East-end and the West-end. In essence, lesbian residents hold opinions of the lesbians residing in the "other" community which have political and ideological implications.

The Virtual Spaces of Lesbian and Bisexual Women's Electronic
Mailing Lists 45
Celeste Wincapaw

The lesbian and bisexual women's electronic mailing lists of the Internet have created electronic lesbian and bisexual spaces which simultaneously reflect and yet differ from real-time lesbian spaces. This paper summarizes data collected in a 1995-96 survey in which over 100 subscribers of the lesbian and bisexual women's mailing lists answered both qualitative and quantitative questions about the interface between their on-line and real-time lives. As is reported in this paper, many of the survey respondents sought lesbian and bisexual on-line spaces where they could avoid men and heterosexuals but, in order to do so, had to negotiate the sometimes-difficult terrain of electronic co-existence with a diverse group of lesbians and/or bisexuals. This diversity caused difficulties for some survey respondents which mirrored many of the difficulties of their real-time lives. Yet, the impetus was also planted for the development of identity-specific electronic mailing lists where like-minded lesbians and/or bisexuals could enjoy affirming communication and interaction.

And Still, the Lesbian Threat: or, How to Keep a Good
Woman a Woman 61
Ali Grant

The regulatory fictions of sex and gender have been implicated in the maintenance of a compulsory heterosexual order and gender hierarchy. Through a consideration of particular geographies of oppression and resistance-local white feminist anti-violence activism-this paper illustrates some of the concrete

manifestations of the deployment of these fictions in the regulation of gendered performances. By presenting certain aspects of political activism as 'UnWomanly Acts,' it is suggested that the frequent marginalization and displacement of politicized lesbians and other transgressive females in specific locations reduces the potential of these as sites of resistance, whilst simultaneously shoring up the regulatory power of the terms lesbian and woman. The paper hopes to add to projects of re-assessment and re-alignment current in anti-oppression struggles, by reaffirming the threat that multiple lesbian identities continue to pose to heterosexual hegemony across space.

 from the Installation 113
Cydra MacDowall

The following photo/text work is an extract from a much larger installation of photographs and text. The photographs have a modified generic quality: colour landscapes and self-portraits in tourist sites across America, the images similar to postcards or amateur tourist/family photographs. The stories, by contrast, are grounded in an individual specificity of response to the sites and events of the trip to fiction as allegorical anecdotes. The work conjoins a personal, lesbian and poetic narrative with familiar and potentially mundane images. The format of the tourist plaque is an appropriation of the trope of 'official' authority that uses such markers to direct and define what is currently and historically significant.

The work explores questions of: the ambiguity of identity through association, lesbian invisibility, cross gender play, homo/lesbo eroticism, women's access to and ownership of public space, the imaginary of the 'road trip,' landscape in photography, the documentary function of photography, photographic history, heterosexual assumption, etc. The work constructs a lesbian cognitive map of space, place, memory and history. The work (initially) appears simple in presenting familiar imagery with personal stories that explore theoretical ideas of lesbian subjecthood.

- Exploring Lesbian Archetypes; or, Reviving 'Drooping Wings' 127

The purpose of this paper is to analyze a series of feminist archetypes and expand this analysis to concentrate on lesbian interpretations of these archetypes. The related notions, spiritualities and myths are defined in order to contextualize feminist archetypes. It is contended that there is a difference between traditional female archetypes and feminist ones. Four feminist archetypes which are relevant for lesbians are examined: Salamander, Dryad, Soothsayer and Virgin. All of these archetypes were originally envisaged by Mary Daly in her book *Wickedary* (with Jane Caputi).

The present study investigated relations among lesbians' disclosure of their sexual orientation, positive and negative emotionality, and relationship satisfaction. The 305 respondents, who were currently in a committed relationship with one woman or seriously dating one woman, responded to a questionnaire assessing level of self-disclosure, sources of social support, self-esteem, positive affectivity, and anxiety. Women who more widely disclosed their sexual orientation expressed a greater degree of satisfaction with their relationships. Path analyses revealed that the discrepancy between partners' level of self-disclosure had a direct effect on the relationship satisfaction, suggesting that the greater the discrepancy, the lower the relationship satisfaction. However, disclosure of sexual orientation had an indirect effect on relationship satisfaction, as it affected social support.

'A Person Positions Herself on Quicksand': The Postmodern
Politics of Identity and Location in Sarah Schulman's *Empathy* 7
Sonya Andermahr

This article discusses Sarah Schulman's 1993 novel Empathy in the context of contemporary debates about the politics of identity and location. It begins by discussing the impact of challenges from postmodernism and from Black, post-colonial and lesbian feminisms on feminist theories of identity, highlighting the concepts of diversity and intrasexual difference. The article goes on to explore Schulman's novel as an example of contemporary lesbian feminist fiction which engages these debates both in its subject matter, by deconstructing the categories of 'race,' gender and sexuality and, formally, in its use of postmodern stylistic devices. It argues that Schulman's novel represents both a postmodern critique of essentialist theories of gender identity, recognising the multiple locations of subjects, and a feminist critique of postmodern cultural relativism and political irresponsibility, insisting on the realities of social injustice. The main part of the article examines Schulman's treatment of four key issues: psychoanalysis and theories of sexual difference which pathologise lesbianism; heterosexism as reproducing women's oppression in patriarchy; the politics of representation whereby lesbian desire is written out; and American cultural imperialism and ethnocentrism. The article concludes by highlighting Schulman's assertion that empathy constitutes a valuable political stance in postmodern times.

Even with the major movements in current gender studies that attempt to expand the simple notions of monolithic identity there are still major blind spots that perpetuate what they seek to disrupt. These blind spots are sometimes heterosexist, sometimes racist, or sometimes both. This essay analyzes how the lesbian of color is situated at the interstices of many fields of identity studies—gender, queer, and ethnic—and the specific difficulties she has with this position. By using the theories of Judith Butler and Gloria Anzaldúa, I describe how the lesbian of color can survive numerous sites of hostility by constructing a positive identity within her own ethnic/racial community through creative acts of cultural revision. After considering the power of these acts I call for the empowered performance of the mestiza state—the state of contradiction wherein the lesbian of color finds herself.

Based on an analysis of Kay Summerscale's (1997) biography The Queen of Whale Cay, Jeanette Winterson's (1997) novel Gut Symmetries and Patricia Duncker's novel Hallucinating Foucault (1996), I argue that the emergence of postmodernism and queer has led to a re-positioning of 'the lesbian' in a number of contemporary texts whereby the once taken-for-granted notions of women and their relation to each other have become subsumed under an interrogation not so much of gender, the queer term, but of textuality, the postmodern turn. The result is a dispersal and simultaneously a re-patriation of 'the lesbian' which obliterates her within the indifference of the text.

The Intimate Distance of Desire: June Jordan's
Bisexual Inflections 81

Through an exploration of June Jordan's poetry and prose, this essay questions contemporary definitions of bisexuality and lesbian writing, and attempts to enact a nonbinary bisexual reading praxis. I argue that Jordan employs several tactics—including ambivalently gendered pronouns, oscillations among apparently distinct categories of meaning, shifting referents, and performative speech acts—to resist restrictive identity politics. These bisexual inflections enable Jordan to replace conventional Enlightenment-based concepts of isolated, self-enclosed identities with open-ended models of identity formation that transform both herself and her readers. Moving between sameness and difference, Jordan's bisexual inflections destabilize the binary system structuring sexual, gender, and ethnic categories, creating an intersubjective matrix where new commonalities can arise.

In order to be a radical political activity, lesbian theory has to resist heterosexual dominance and the terms in which that dominance and mastery are inscribed. How can this be done? This paper uses Jacques Lacan's theory of the Four Discourses to examine the discursive and subject positions involved in critical analysis of psychoanalytic theory itself. Feminist cultural analysts have attempted to adopt the position of the hysteric in critiquing the master narrative of Freud. As Jacobus (1986) shows, Freud was himself subject to hysteria in producing narratives of women and femininity. Feminist and lesbian critiques, in their attachment to woman, risk repeating the oversight of the hysteric and the analyst (and reinforcing mastery) by continuing to view sexuality in terms of a bisexuality composed of masculine and feminine components. Perhaps what is needed is an attempt to produce a discourse of perversion-not formulated by Lacan-beyond the phallus and beyond the constructions of the man/woman thing.

This paper considers recent critical responses to Radclyffe Hall's 1928 novel The Well of Loneliness. While Hall's portrayal of mannish invert Stephen Gordon has had a troubled reception in this century, recent work celebrating butch-femme identity and practice has gained the novel wider acceptance among lesbian critics. While these recuperations are significant in working against homophobic readings of The Well, they often overlook the real difficulties Hall described. This paper argues for the historical significance of Hall's work as a reflection of the lived experience of lesbians in a homophobic society.

Lesbian Immunity from HIV/AIDS: Fact or Fiction? 131
 Denise M. Montcalm

The number of HIV positive lesbians is on the rise. Yet, the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention has no statistical category by which to classify female-to-female transmitted AIDS cases. Women who have sex with women have been dismissed as a "low risk" group without the benefit of empirical data. This study used data collected from subscribers of an international lesbian magazine (n = 248) to examine how beliefs held by lesbians may be influencing their risk for contracting HIV. Using the Health Belief Model, it was anticipated that perceived personal risk, knowledge regarding HIV transmission mechanisms, knowing a lesbian with HIV, or having been diagnosed HIV positive would increase the use of safer sex practices. Regression analysis found perceived personal risk, knowing a lesbian with HIV, and educational level significant predictors of barrier use.

Deprived of mainstream recognition, lesbian partners must find alternative ways to imbue their partnerships with significance. Partners' story themes featured fateful first meetings and triumphs over adversity. The study suggests that the storytelling ability displayed in these interviews may be the hallmark of populations typically excluded from the dominant cultural narrative.

Heightened Sensitivity to Conflict on the Part of Female Criminal Defenders: Myth, Reality, or Hyperbole? 1

David R. Lynch

A popular perception among some criminal attorneys is that female public defenders are more stressed than are males by the type of occupational conflict that is central to the adversarial role. One might also be tempted to make such an inference upon examination of literature on sex-based differences in the areas of aggression, competitiveness, and role expectations, and after review of the works of relational feminists and some feminist legal scholars. However, this paper presents results of regression analyses which suggest that though some gender-based sensitivity to criminal courthouse conflict appears to exist, evidence that such sensitivity is of any substantive magnitude is lacking. Hence, concerns that conflict-based advocacy is a "male way" of practicing criminal law or that greater risks confront female defenders than male defenders in the areas of health and career satisfaction were not supported by these data.

Women, Crime and Drugs: Testing the Effect of Therapeutic Communities 21

Amy Farrell

As more women are brought into the criminal justice system for crimes related to drug usage, it is necessary to understand how the unique position of addicted female offenders may affect their successful participation in conventional drug treatment programs. This study examines the influence of social organization and systems of support on the female inmate's ability to successfully re-integrate, stay clean, and remain free of crime upon release from prison. Using data from a prison-based therapeutic community called CREST, serving male and female offenders in Delaware, this study compares the ability of female treatment program participants (test group) and work release participants (control group) to form networks of support and stability once released from prison. Additionally, this study examines the influence of systems of support on rates of recidivism or returning to drug use. By using a two-pronged study of social support building and recidivism for female offenders, the overall effectiveness of therapeutic communities for a unique and important population can be examined.

Defeminizing and Dehumanizing Female Murderers: Depictions of Lesbians on Death Row 49

Case studies of the 35 women on death row in 1993 suggest that hetero-feminine image is important in engendering chivalry and thus leniency toward female offenders. Lesbians in particular were over-represented in atypical death sentence cases. Featured are media and prosecutorial representations of the cases of five lesbians on death row. These offenders were depicted as manly and man-hating women who occupy additional marginalized statuses, and who vent their rage and irrational desire for revenge through killing. Argued is that this homo-sexualized portrayal of female evil may affect sentencing decisions as an additional "aggravating circumstance" in an already heinous crime.

A Comparative Study of Nine Counties in North Carolina 67

After the major reforms of sexual assault laws between 1960 and 1975, a number of studies examined the changes in sexual assault reports to the police and the prosecution of these cases; however, little research has studied changes in law enforcement investigative procedures of sexual assault cases. This study examines the processes used in the investigation of sexual assault cases by police and sheriff departments in nine counties of North Carolina. The procedures of these departments are compared with a set of new practices identified as effective by Epstein and Langenbahn (1994). These practices, or reforms, include specialized sexual assault investigative units, in-house victim/witness advocates, acceptance of anonymous reports from victims who do not wish to prosecute, written procedures, multiple interviews, confidentiality of the victim from the media, specialized training for investigators as well as patrol officers, and specific criteria for the selection of investigators. The law enforcement departments examined in the current study vary in their implementation of the reforms advocated by Epstein and Langenbahn. The relationships between specific characteristics of the departments and the community and the variation in implementation are not significant; however, the departments' association with the rape crisis centers in their communities is significantly related to the existence of written procedures, a specialized unit, and the use of blind reports. Sexual assault to some degree continues to focus on the issue of consent and the victims' behavior, but there does appear to be an increase in officers' sensitivity to victims' needs.

Romantic codefendant relationships are conditioned by law enforcement efforts and the social control and surveillance which romantic partners exert in the home, on the street, and in jail and prison. Living in everyday policed states, women with romantic codefendants face significant barriers to accessing drug treatment as an alternative to incarceration.*

- The homosexual behavior of male inmates has been extensively studied; however, similar behaviors by female inmates, other than descriptions of the role of masculinity in prison settings, has been virtually ignored. Observations suggest that the incidence of both lesbianism and unusual masculinity among females may be higher in prisons and jails than in the general population. This study surveyed both heterosexual and homosexual female detainees to determine whether lesbian inmates, particularly those with a masculinized appearance, are more prone to violent or antisocial behavior, than heterosexual females without masculine features and, if so, whether this relationship is a function of biological conditions or sociological influences. Results indicated that lesbian detainees had more masculine traits, more feelings of hostility and anger, and experienced more physical child abuse than did heterosexual detainees. Although they did not report significantly more violent crimes, they were more often detained for longer periods of time. And while self-reported symptoms of Attention Deficit and Conduct Disorders were more prevalent in lesbian detainees, other conditions of biologic origin were not related to sexual preference. These findings suggest that lesbian detainees are treated more harshly by the criminal justice system and that further research is needed to sort out the various biological and social contributors to behavioral and attitudinal differences.*

- Dispositional Empathy and the Political Gender Gap 1

The gender gap in contemporary American politics refers to differences in political attitudes and behavior between men and women that may be traced back to the 1980 presidential election and the Reagan presidency. For nearly two decades, men have displayed consistently more conservative and pro-Republican preferences than women. Although the gender gap has been well-documented and recognized by practitioners and scholars alike, explanations of why women have been less supportive of the conservative agenda in the Reagan and post-Reagan years have not been explained satisfactorily. In this exploratory study, we suggest that the gender-based political divisions observed in American politics have their origins in exogenous dispositions that men and women bring with them to the political environment. Specifically, women are more predisposed than men to display empathy toward distressed others in society. Differences in dispositions toward empathy are stimulated in the political arena when the agendas of candidates emphasize issues that motivate empathic predispositions. Under such circumstances, women are more inclined than men to express support for liberal policy preferences, and, thus, empathy is a concept that may help us to better understand the nature of the political gender gap.

This research focuses on the gendered nature of legislative institutions by examining the conflict resolution styles of state legislative committee chairs. Based on a survey of 285 state legislative committee chairs, focus groups and individual interviews, the study examines a sizeable cohort of men and women engaged in fundamentally similar leadership tasks but under varying institutional circumstances and in more than a single state. The research finds that women committee chairs raise their voices to resolve conflicts in a different way from their male colleagues. More importantly, the study shows how gender composition of the membership, the distribution of gender power, and the extent of professionalization influence conflict resolution style. These data challenge the predominant view of legislative leadership as transactional behavior and suggest the need to consider whether masculine behavior and institutional norms have been conflated.

Current analysis focuses on both the origins and effectiveness of such agencies. However, such analysis is predominantly based on studies from the developed world. Thus, examination of individual cases from the developing world can expand our understanding of the potential of state equality advocacy by extending comparative empirical and theoretical perspectives on gender and the state. This paper presents the case of the Venezuelan agency for women. One of the oldest agencies in the region, it has changed considerably over the course of its history. It has proved to be a major catalyst for gender equality advocacy but also demonstrates the potential risks of institutionalizing such advocacy.

Since 1945 the situation of women in Austrian politics has changed slowly but surely. This article concentrates on the representation of women in the political parties, parliamentary delegations, and in the party leadership positions. The number of women in the individual political parties determines the level of representation of women in parliament. In this connection, changes in legislation and party rules regarding the participation of women which took place after 1945 are analysed, as well as the development of women's quotas in the party executive committees. I also compare the actual proportions of women in the party executives with the official targets given in the party rules where such quotas exist. Furthermore, the article discusses channels of legislative recruitment and their effects on drawing up the party lists. Finally, the question of strengthening the preference voting system as a chance to increase women's quotas is dealt with from the viewpoint of various Austrian political parties.

Using data obtained over a nine-year period from the metropolitan São Paulo area, this paper examines the contribution of Brazilian Catholic base Christian communities (comunidades eclesiais de base-CEBs) to enhanced intra-group political activation and awareness among women members. The study shows that through their various activities, the CEBs over time have offered women opportunities for empowerment within the context of their own groups. Nevertheless, initial differences observed between women and men in terms of enhanced political awareness and the propensity to internal activism do, however, appear to persist over time. This finding, which suggests a somewhat circumscribed contribution of the CEBs to women's empowerment at the group level, is subsequently explained not only in terms of possible constraints to women's involvement in the more political dimensions of group life, but also with reference to the different ways women and men, respectively, may perceive of their CEB-related roles and responsibilities.

- Attitudes Toward Domestic Violence Among Romanian
and U.S. University Students: A Cross-Cultural Comparison 27

In this article we compare the attitudes toward domestic violence of university students in Romania and in the United States, both states in which domestic violence is a problem but with very different governing ideologies and very different levels of public awareness. The United States is examined as an example of a liberal regime in which at least in theory, clear distinctions are drawn between the public and private spheres. Romania represents an example of a regime which is in transition from a totalitarian form of government in which everything was potentially politicized to a liberal democracy. In our study of both the Romanian and the American students, we found that their perceptions of the boundary between the public and the private spheres in regard to domestic violence are not as clear-cut as some theorists believe. Where domestic violence has become part of the public discourse, perceptions about whether police and the community should intervene to protect women have changed.

Since Schattschneider (1960), several scholars have argued that the least powerful groups in society will have limited access to the governmental arena; the bias inherent in the system will largely prevent those lacking in power from attaining many of their policy preferences. Yet race and gender-based groups, two of the least powerful groups in society, have been relatively successful in getting some of their demands turned into policy.

We argue that these groups have been relatively successful for two major reasons. First, they are utilizing the Supreme Court to get their demands on the political agenda. Second, they have coalesced their resources, giving them a stronger voice in which to demand change. This preliminary analysis of the success of these groups bodes well for other disadvantaged groups demanding change in the governmental forum.
