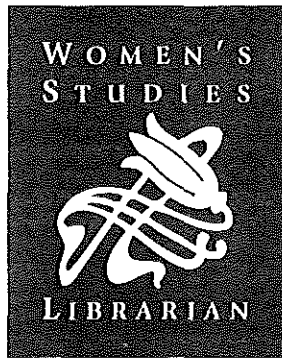

Periodical literature is the cutting edge of women's scholarship, feminist theory, and much of women's culture. *Feminist Periodicals: A Current Listing of Contents* is published by the Office of the University of Wisconsin System Women's Studies Librarian on a quarterly basis with the intent of increasing public awareness of feminist periodicals. It is our hope that *Feminist Periodicals* will serve several purposes: to keep the reader abreast of current topics in feminist literature; to increase readers' familiarity with a wide spectrum of feminist periodicals; and to provide the requisite bibliographic information should a reader wish to subscribe to a journal or to obtain a particular article at her library or through interlibrary loan. (Users will need to be aware of the limitations of the new copyright law with regard to photocopying of copyrighted materials.)

Table of contents pages from current issues of major feminist journals are reproduced in each issue of *Feminist Periodicals*, preceded by a comprehensive annotated listing of all journals we have selected. As publication schedules vary enormously, not every periodical will have table of contents pages reproduced in each issue of *FP*. The annotated listing provides the following information on each journal:

1. Year of first publication.
2. Frequency of publication.
3. U.S. subscription price(s).
4. Subscription address.
5. Current editor.
6. Editorial address (if different from subscription address).
7. International Standard Serials Number (ISSN).
8. OCLC, Inc. Control Number.
9. Locations where the journal is held in the UW System.
10. Publications in which the journal is indexed.
11. Fulltext products in which publication appears or vendor intermediaries who make the full text available.
12. Subject focus/statement of purpose of the journal.

Please note that in the actual text, only the numbers 1 to 12 are used to identify the different categories of information.

Our goal is to have represented in *FP* all English-language feminist periodicals with a substantial national or regional readership, with an emphasis on scholarly journals and small press offerings. We do not include publications that, though feminist in philosophy, do not focus solely on women's issues. Nor, with few exceptions, do we include newsstand magazines. We are also forced to omit periodicals that lack a complete table of contents. We encourage feminist serials to build a full table of contents into their regular format to facilitate the indexing feminist literature sorely needs.

Interested readers will find more complete information on feminist periodicals in *DWM: A Directory of Women's Media* published by the National Council for Research on Women (530 Broadway at Spring Street, New York, NY 10012); and in *Women's Periodicals and Newspapers: A Union List of the Holdings of Madison Area Libraries*, edited by James P. Danky, compiled by Maureen E. Hady, Barry Christopher, and Neill E. Strache (Boston: G.K. Hall, 1982).

Suggestions for improvements of *Feminist Periodicals* are gratefully received. We would particularly appreciate assistance from readers in the UW System with our efforts to keep the holding information complete and up to date. Please let us know about new subscriptions, subscriptions we have overlooked, cancellations, or other pertinent information. *Feminist Periodicals* is also available on microfilm at the library of the State Historical Society of Wisconsin.

Louise Bourgeois, sage-femme de la Reine de France, Marie de Médicis, connaît une brillante carrière jusqu'en juin 1627. En effet, à la suite de la mort *post-partum* de Marie de Bourbon Montpensier, qu'elle avait elle-même assistée lors de son accouchement, une polémique l'oppose aux médecins de la Cour de France. Ces derniers, unis dans une offensive sexiste, la discréditent et sa carrière prend alors brutalement fin. Loin d'être anecdotique, son cas témoigne davantage de la restriction progressive du champ d'activité des sages-femmes caractéristique du XVII^e siècle, ainsi que de la répression systématique de toute forme de savoir et donc de pouvoir détenus par des femmes.

Une Anti-sorcière : la sage-femme messagère des Lumières, dans la psycho-prophylaxie obstétricale

Marianne Caron-Leulliez et Jocelyne George.....36

Jusqu'en 1950, les sages-femmes furent porteuses, comme la société et le corps médical, d'une conception doloriste de l'accouchement qui infantilisait les femmes et les maintenait dans un contexte de peur alimenté par l'ignorance. La préparation psycho-prophylactique à l'accouchement, qui se développe en France à partir de 1952, modifie profondément le rôle de ces sages-femmes. Autant qu'obstétriciennes, elles deviennent enseignantes et psychologues, pour élucider avec les futurs parents (père autant que mère) ce que l'accouchement peut avoir de mystère inquiétant. Elles enseignent à la femme comment maîtriser son corps et mettre au monde son enfant sans être submergée par la douleur. Mais la méthode de l'« accouchement sans douleur » est contestée dans les années 1970. Depuis 1980, l'indolorisation se fait de plus en plus par l'anesthésie péridurale et la naissance est plus médicalisée, ce qui, à nouveau, relègue la sage-femme au rang d'auxiliaire du médecin et infantilise la femme en couches. Aujourd'hui, de plus en plus de sages-femmes cherchent une alternative et prônent le retour à des méthodes psycho-prophylactiques qui, sans sombrer dans le rejet de la science et de la modernité, permettraient à la femme et au couple de se réappropriier la naissance.

Génie et parthénogénèse: la représentation de la sorcière comme révolutionnaire chez Jules Michelet

Salah Khan.....50

Dans son étude *La Sorcière*, Jules Michelet brosse le tableau de la résistance radicale d'une catégorie de femmes au Moyen Age. Si, tout comme la figure du révolutionnaire de 1789, Michelet décrit la sorcière comme l'ennemi du prêtre, « le péril » même du clergé, la caractéristique la plus remarquable de la sorcière tient à son pouvoir de parthénogénèse : « sa sublime puissance de la conception solitaire ». Comme le terme de « parthénogénèse » dérive du grec *parthenos* (vierge, immaculée), nous comprenons que la sorcière représente une figure de chaos particulièrement dangereuse pour l'Eglise puisqu'elle reprend, autrement, le rôle de la matrice féminine du Christianisme. Dans l'analyse de Michelet, la sorcière remplacera même la figure privilégiée de l'homme-génie du peuple révolutionnaire. Son pouvoir parthénogénétique de *création à partir de rien*, constitue un modèle puissant pour l'histoire générale de l'émancipation des femmes, notamment en ce que la sorcière agit en *rupture radicale* d'avec les conditions de son oppression.

Zénon, sorcier avorteur, sorcier créateur, ou le double inversé de Marguerite Yourcenar

May Chehab.....63

Zénon, le personnage masculin principal de *L'Œuvre au Noir* de Marguerite Yourcenar, est un médecin atypique qui fonctionne comme correctif idéologique de la chasse aux sorcières de la Renaissance. Relayant dans l'œuvre, par « ventriloquie », la voix yourcenarienne, il permet de nouveaux enfantements : celui de Yourcenar qui écrit une histoire compensatoire de sa naissance, celui de l'œuvre en train de s'écrire et celui d'une écriture de femme.

Hélène Cixous and the Un/forgettable Child

Claudine G. Fisher.....79

In the fictional texts *Neutre* (1972) and *Le Jour où je n'étais pas là* (2000), Hélène Cixous weaves the tapestry of a woman's life faced with the difficulties of motherhood after the birth of a Trisomy 21 child and his subsequent death. By pulling together birth/death, forgotten/unforgettable, revealed/hidden, Cixous transforms the protagonist's ambivalent feelings into a positive struggle of the wise woman and the mid-wife (femme sage and sage-femme.) Both books, written twenty-eight years apart, stand as a study in contrast but respond to each other, illuminating Cixous' autobiographical path and the crucial link of the book as redemptive judge.

L'Ambiguïté du portrait féminin dans le roman camerounais : déesse et sorcière

Cécile Dolisane-Ebossè.....93

Cette étude vise à montrer que le roman camerounais peint la femme de manière paradoxale : tantôt elle est une déesse, tantôt elle est une sorcière. Mais si les écrivains identifient la femme sexuellement libérée à une diablesse, les romancières, quant à elles, tentent de la replonger dans ses racines ancestrales afin qu'émerge, à partir de ce corps jadis prohibé, la puissance irradiante des sorcières d'antan.

Sorcery and Storytelling: Reconfigurations of the Feminine Topos in Simone Schwarz-Bart's *Pluie et vent sur Téliumée* Miracle and Maryse Condé's "Nanna-Ya"

Assimina Karavanta.....108

This paper explores the trope of the "sage-femme/sorceress" in the works of Simone Schwarz-Bart's *The Bridge of Beyond* and Maryse Condé's "Nanna-Ya" to illuminate the political, social and historical agenda of this motif/trope of the sage-femme/sorceress, whose individual life, as the life of a woman-healer who stands *a-part* from her context and thus represents a deviant, errant power, is intertwined with the writing of the complex colonial, postcolonial and neo-colonial history of her community.

The Assumption and Reorganization of Sex in the Prologue to the *Heptaméron*

Todd W. Reeser.....127

Discussions of gender and gender fluidity in Marguerite de Navarre's *Heptaméron* generally assume a stable notion of sex. In this article, I argue that instead of taking sex for granted, the opening scene of Marguerite's prologue allegorizes the creation of sex in a non-sexist mold. The text then reiterates its brand of sex by carving out sexual symmetry amongst the *devisants*. At the end of the prologue, sex is hidden, thus assumed, as the text hands the narrative over to gender so that the subsequent *nouvelles* can focus on gender and relations between the sexes. Cultural and literary sources such as Renaissance bath imagery, Calvin, and Ovid are taken into account.

Un discours féministe ? Les représentations de lectrices dans les romans pédagogiques de Louise d'Épinay, Caroline de Genlis et Isabelle de Charrière

Sandrine Aragon.....144

Dans la seconde moitié du XVIII^e siècle, des femmes s'engagent dans l'écriture de romans pédagogiques : Louise d'Épinay avec *Les Conversations d'Émilie* (1774), Caroline de Genlis avec *Adèle et Théodore* (1782) ou Isabelle de Charrière dans *Les Lettres écrites de Lausanne* (1785) montrent leur intérêt pour la question de l'éducation féminine. Comment se situent-elles par rapport aux discours masculins contemporains et notamment aux doctrines rousseauistes ? Quels programmes tracent-elles dans leurs écrits ? Que signifie cet investissement pour ces auteures ?

Olympe de Gouges, anti-esclavagiste et non-violente

Catherine Masson.....153

L'ensemble des textes à la périphérie de *L'Esclavage des Noirs* d'Olympe de Gouges, montre que ce drame est ancré dans la tempête des événements historiques. Une analyse de ces textes, précédée d'une étude de l'évolution de la pièce dans le contexte précis des événements historiques, permet de réévaluer les ambiguïtés qui ont été notées et commentées par les critiques, et donc, de repenser aux causes de celles-ci. Il devient alors possible de voir ce qu'il en est de la « modération » d'Olympe de Gouges et comment elle tente de réconcilier son idéal de justice et d'égalité pour tous en n'envisageant cette libération que dans la non-violence.

Parole de femme : *Namokel* de Catherine Lépront

Brigitte Le Juez.....166

A travers le récit du cheminement intérieur d'une jeune Française, *Namokel* est une réflexion sur les moyens dont a disposé la génération de l'après-Deuxième Guerre mondiale pour se représenter l'horreur de la guerre et rendre compte de son effroi devant tout conflit armé, fût-il politique ou militaire. Pendant onze années, cinq amies mènent une véritable enquête sur ce qui s'est passé avant leur époque pour comprendre dans quel monde elles vivent. Lépront s'intéresse particulièrement à la perspective des femmes, aux rôles qui leur incombent durant les guerres, et met l'accent sur l'importance de la parole des femmes dans la véracité et la continuité de l'Histoire.

'Porteuse de la vie des autres' : Ernaux's *Journal du dehors* as Anti-diary

Valérie Baisnée.....177

This essay discusses one of Annie Ernaux's lesser-studied works, *Journal du dehors*. It focuses on her adaptation of the *journal intime* in the context of the modern trend in autobiographical writing as well as in relation to Ernaux's own positioning within popular culture. Ernaux, who has denied practicing confessional writing, sees her own self mirrored in the people she meets in her everyday life. Thus, she shows that self-knowledge can be obtained by merely looking and observing people around her. The essay examines the implications of this different way of reconciling the personal and the political.

Métaphores, métamorphoses et retournements symboliques dans *Truismes* de Marie Darrieussecq : mais qui finit à l'abattoir ?

Nora Cottille-Foley.....188

Cet essai, présenté en anglais, à Memphis en 1999, puis en français, à Sousse en mai 2000, explore les significations de la métamorphose dans *Truismes* de Marie Darrieussecq, remontant pour cela aux origines étymologiques du terme truie. La truie, en tant que métaphore, permet de dénoncer le système de marchandisation sexuelle et d'auto-dénigrement attaché à l'image de la femme. Utilisée stratégiquement, elle permet un renversement symbolique. Entre l'humain et l'animal, le corps de la protagoniste met en scène la coexistence d'antithèses, et par-là même, permet la subversion progressive des oppositions binaires sur lesquelles repose tout un système d'exclusion qu'il parvient à déstabiliser.

La Dénomination humaine chez quelques écrivaines féministes en France, au Québec, au Maghreb : androcentrisme ou parité ?

Edwige Khaznadar.....207

En français, la dénomination de la femme au féminin, qui assure sa visibilité sociale dans les médias écrits, est une conquête des féministes dans le dernier quart du XX^e siècle. Elle reste encore mal assurée, spécialement en France, principalement à cause de l'usage toujours dominant du masculin générique. Un rappel de l'essentiel des règles linguistiques qui commandent l'emploi du masculin et du féminin permet d'analyser l'usage qu'adoptent en fait plusieurs écrivaines féministes, deux membres de WIF y comprises. Le but de l'étude est la prise de conscience de nos propres habitudes langagières, de leur dépendance ou indépendance à l'égard de l'unilatéralité masculine, afin de faciliter à tout un chacune la clarification de son discours sur l'humanité.

Reading Duras's *Le Ravissement de Lol V. Stein* like a Feminist

Zahi Zalloua.....228

In this paper, I seek to challenge the essentializing tendencies in current feminist readings of Duras's *Le Ravissement de Lol V. Stein*. In contrast to critics who either engage in an essentialist identification with the character of Lol or tend to exclude *a priori* the male narrator Jacques Hold, I demonstrate how a feminist reading depends less on the reader's ability to share Lol's "experience" than on the reader's alertness to the complexity of Jacques Hold's writing of Lol, that is, to his writing of her *ravissement* and the *ravissement* of his writing. One-sided readings of Jacques's male narrative (either by radically displacing the importance of his role or by treating him as a one-dimensional character/narrator) run the risk of simply reversing the male totalizing reading of Lol (uncritical acceptance of the narrator's voice) to a feminist totalizing reading of Jacques (an irresponsible dismissal of Jacques's narratorial authority). Indeed, a critical reading of Duras's *Le Ravissement de Lol V. Stein* must avoid what could be described as the blackmail of some feminist critics: a reader must be either *for* or *against* Jacques Hold.
